

**WILSON COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH
MINUTES**

Welcome and Reappointments

Dr. Scott Dixon, called the meeting to order at 6:03pm and welcomed all in attendance. Ms. Ellen recognized Dr. Shannon Drohan and Ms. Rosario Ochoa for being reappointed and thanked them for their willingness to continue serving on the Board.

Approval of Minutes of March 2020 Meeting

The minutes from the March 2020 meeting were accepted without corrections, additions or deletions.

Review and approval of the minutes shall be construed as review/discussion/approval/of all items distributed prior to the meeting for consideration and shall be so reflected in the minutes.

Administration

Ms. Cinnamon Narron presented the 2020-2021 Year-to-Date Summary Report. (See Handout). Ms. Narron said everything looks well at this time through May and we are still drawing down a little State money. She reports that we have received our Cost Settlement money (\$499,786) and it was more than what was budgeted. Ms. Teresa Ellen added that \$88,000 was also received in COVID funding from the Department of Public Health. Ms. Narron reported all programs should finish in the black at the end of the fiscal year after drawing down the remaining State funds and any other revenues.

Ms. Narron discussed the new FY 20-21 Fee Schedule (See Handout). Ms. Narron reported the fee approval committee met to discuss making changes to the fee schedule. They based their decisions on reimbursements by Medicaid and private insurance and the documentation that is received with the Cost Settlement showing what it costs us to provide the service. Most of the changes made resulted in very little increase. These changes will become effective July 1, 2020. There was no discussion. Dr. Shannon Drohan made a motion to accept the 20-21 Fee Schedule as submitted and Dr. Maria Glennon seconded. There was no opposition.

Personal Health

Valerie Bulluck, Director of Nursing reported on contract tracing which is a part of Communicable Disease Surveillance. Ms. Bulluck reported contact tracing has always been a part of our public health responsibilities, but with the COVID-19 the volume that we must follow has increased exponentially. We have trained a few people using the tool the State provided to educate people who have been exposed to COVID-19 on their need to self-quarantined for 14 days and they are followed up on to make sure they

do not become symptomatic. All contacts are instructed regarding the importance to stay quarantined until the incubation period is exhausted and if they do develop symptoms they are asked to schedule to be tested here.

Ms. Linda Cooper-Suggs reported she was aware that African Americans are more disproportionately affected with this virus and she was truly shocked to see how many African Americans have died in Wilson County. She asked Ms. Ellen what she is going to do to improve the conditions in the Wilson County. Ms. Cooper-Suggs says she works a lot with pastors and churches throughout the community and said if she could help in any way to let her know. Ms. Ellen reported she is working with Carolina Families Health Center CEO, Laura Owens. She explained that since we are largely responsible for so much contact tracing, we do not have the capacity to do large scale community testing. Carolina Families Health Centers are federally funded they have received a significant amount of funding to do testing. Trinity House of Deliverance has called to inquire about testing and Carolina Families Health Centers will be contacting them.

Ms. Ellen reported she is open to recommendations. The zip code 27893 contains over half of our positive COVID cases. Ms. Ellen stated she is looking at doing more testing in that zip code and to our vulnerable populations. Ms. Cooper-Suggs said her church is Jackson Chapel First Missionary Baptist Church and they would gladly serve as a testing site. Ms. Ellen reported she would pass this on to Laura Owens when this meeting is over.

Ms. Bulluck said the health department has finally been credentialed for Behavioral Health services. The Licensed Clinical Social Worker will be doing tele-health possibly beginning in July.

Environmental Health

Ms. Angela Manning, Environmental Health Supervisor reports they are finishing up the fiscal year strong. They will finish the year out at 100% compliance of the rate of inspections except for the ones suspended by the State such as the long-term care facilities and the schools. Ms. Manning reports that on-site has been busy with new lot evaluations. Jeremy Johnson has been hired and Ms. Manning reports he will finish his CIT training by the end of August.

Health Director's Report

Ms. Teresa Ellen, Health Director reported there are 460 positive cases in Wilson County as of 5:00PM today. There are 326 estimated or assumed to be recovered out of the 460 cases. There are 101 people isolated at home, 20 people are hospitalized (locally and area hospitals) and 13 are deceased. The total that is estimated or assumed recovered is 71%. At present there is 121 active cases. Ms. Ellen reported the staff has been phenomenal for the last 3 months.

Dr. Dixon asked if there is a demographic breakdown on the data. Ms. Ellen reports that out of the 460 cases 261 are African American (57%), 108 are Caucasian (23%), 82 are Latino (18%) and 4 are Middle Eastern (1%). The long term care facilities that have positive cases are as follows: Elm City Assisted Living has a total of 6 cases-3 residents and 3 staff, with 1 death reported, Wilson House has 46 cases that includes 25 residents and 18 staff, Wilmed Nursing has a total of 20- 16 residents and 4 staff and Longleaf Neuromedical Treatment Facility has a total of 48 cases-23 residents and 25 staff.

Dr. Dixon also asked about the age groups and Ron Hunt reported the age breakdown is 183 cases in the 25-49 age group, 126 in the 50-64 age group and 95 in the 65+ age group. Dr. Stahl added that almost all the COVID deaths are patients 65+. He also reported the hospitalization volume was presently stable and there are currently 13 hospitalized at Wilson Medical Center.

Ms. Ellen reported the COVID phone line is staffed Monday-Friday, 8-5 and took a total of 292 calls last week. She added staff is having their temperature checked daily when they arrive. The COVID clinic is

held in the Lida Blalock Hall and we are doing drive through testing. We have done a total of 848 tests here at the health department.

Dr. Stahl asked about the return of students attending Wilson Community College and Barton College in the fall. Ms. Ellen reported she has been in conversations with them and they are looking at the guidelines by the State that include wearing a mask and trying to maintain the 6 feet in the classroom, cleaning between classes, limiting gatherings and making sure they have space if needed to quarantine students. Food will probably be pre-packaged or grab and go instead of gathering in a cafeteria.

Ms. Ellen reported we are getting new guidance every day and she and Ron Hunt are doing a Facebook video each week and giving updates to the newspaper daily. In addition to the \$88,000 COVID funding mentioned earlier, WIC received some additional funds that will help with remodeling in their area and that will also help with social distancing. Ms. Cooper-Suggs asked Ms. Ellen if she had been in touch with Dr. Mills and his team from Wilson County Schools. Ms. Ellen reported she has, and it will be basically the same strategies mentioned with the colleges and she feels it will be a challenge especially with the small children.

The Health Care Foundation grant request has been approved and Ms. Ellen says we are thankful for their support. This will mean we will be moving forward with opening the WASH center at Hunt and proceed with the plans for opening a WASH center at Barton. The Wilson County Schools received a grant that will cover the cost for the remodeling needed for the Hunt WASH center. Ms. Ellen reports construction should be completed and ready to open by the beginning of the school year.

Ms. Ellen reports the dental truck should be received by the end of June. There are a couple of applicants for a dentist and they will be reviewed soon with Dr. Dixon's help. Ms. Ellen hopes to be able to start the dental program by the beginning of the school year.

Ms. Ellen gave the Child Fatality Report (See Handout) from the Wilson County Child Fatality Prevention Team who reviews all child fatalities in Wilson County from the previous years. Their mission is to identify any system deficiencies that may have contributed to child deaths. They submit a report annually to their local county commissioners and board of health. Their purpose is to make and carry out recommendations for changes that will prevent future child deaths and promote understanding of the causes of child deaths. For the 2018 child deaths that were reviewed in 2019, there was a total of 21. Ms. Ellen reported on the causes of death along with the ages and any system problems identified along with actions taken.

Ms. Ellen reported that probably 95% of our time is spent on COVID 19 although we are still providing all of our regular services for the public. Ms. Ellen thanked the board members for their continued support.

Welcome

Dr. Scott Dixon, called the meeting to order at 6:04pm and welcomed all in attendance.

Approval of Minutes of February 2020 Meeting

The minutes from the February 2020 meeting were accepted without corrections, additions or deletions.

Review and approval of the minutes shall be construed as review/discussion/approval/of all items distributed prior to the meeting for consideration and shall be so reflected in the minutes.

Administration

Ms. Cinnamon Narron presented the 2020-2021 Budget Proposal (See Handout). Ms. Narron went over the budget highlights that shows our Budget is \$7681 less than last year. The Fund Balance is budgeted at \$715,539 which is up \$20,000 from last year but \$130,000 is money from the current year that is unspent which is re-budgeted. Part of the budget is for a salary adjustment of 3.5% COLA as well as an increase in medical insurance. Ms. Narron reported there are no new positions. Ms. Narron reports that Medicaid, fees and insurance collections are up, and the Medicaid max has increased from the prior year.

Ms. Narron reported there are 2 major expenditures in the budget and one of those is to replace the flooring with something more durable and easier to clean in the large nursing office in which we are meeting as well as Environmental Health and WIC. There will also be some minor renovations for the WIC entrance. The total expected for the improvements will be \$44,000. The other major expenditure will be \$22,000 to cover a SUV for Environmental Health.

On page 3 of the packet list the total number of employees/funded positions which is 82 and broken down by departments. Ms. Narron reported the next page shows breakout of the funding sources. Included in the packet are the projected revenue and expenditures for the upcoming new year. There was no discussion. Dr. Dixon asked for a motion to accept the 2020-2021 budget as submitted. Dr. Maria Glennon made a motion to accept the budget as submitted and Dr. Shannon Drohan seconded. There was no opposition.

Personal Health

Valerie Bulluck, Director of Nursing had nothing to report.

Environmental Health

Ms. Angela Manning, Environmental Health Supervisor went over the proposed fees highlighted in yellow (See Handout). These are due to the increase in postage and courier costs. Ms. Manning reported this has really affected their budget because of the water samples they have to send to the State Lab. They are finding with the recent cost increase they are \$20 or more in the negative and would just like to break even. Ms. Manning discussed the new water sample fees and the on-site well water fee. She reported the only fee that would remain the same is the Bacteriological which is currently \$75. This is the most efficient water test and the most common. This test uses 4oz. bottles and when Environmental Health can collect more than one sample in a day, they can put them in all one courier bag that has recently been purchased and will only incur *one* courier fee. There were no questions or discussions. Dr. Dixon asked for a motion to accept the fee increases as submitted. Mr. Bill Blackman made a motion to accept the fee increases as submitted and Ms. Catherine Melin seconded.

Health Director's Report

Ms. Teresa Ellen, Health Director gave an update of where we are with the COVID-19 response. Ms. Ellen said she first wanted to tell the Board how phenomenal the staff has been by stepping up to the plate and adjusting. Ms. Ellen reported just here at the health department we have completed 91 test samples and have 29 more on hand. As of this afternoon, Wilson County has 6 positive cases with the ages ranging 50-63 years of age with 4 of the 6 having underlying health issues. 2 cases seem to be community spread and 4 are travel related. Once the test has been performed the turnaround time from the State Lab has been 48-72 hours and with LabCorp it has been 5-7 days.

Ms. Ellen reported we are still having trouble getting PPE. Wilson Community College has donated some masks to us. Ms. Ellen she will make certain our staff is protected and would never ask staff to go in and take care of a COVID-19 or a suspected COVID-19 patient without the proper PPE. We are now shifting into the Phase II stage which is the acceleration phase. Physicians are being asked to use their best professional judgement if they have a patient in the mild-moderate range and can recover without incident, they are asked to stay home. This will help save test and PPE supplies for the high-risk patients. Ms. Ellen says the high-risk group is now defined as a person over 65, has underlying health conditions, immunocompromised, pregnant women, severe obesity and those who live-in long-term care facilities.

The mitigation strategy is still very much being stressed by staying home if you are sick, washing your hands with soap or using hand sanitizer often, cover your cough and clean surfaces often. Ms. Ellen reports these things will help flatten the curve. A call center has been set up with 5 phones and it is staffed with 4-6 people daily to answer calls regarding COVID-19. The call center can be reached by dialing the main number to the health department and selecting option 3. Drive through testing has been offered for patients of other providers who have called ahead to let us know they have a patient who has tested negative for the flu and the provider feels they may have potential symptoms of COVID-19. Ms. Ellen reported we in turn will contact the patient and give them the option of driving around the back of the building.

All employees are being assessed as they enter the building each morning and having their temperature taken. Ms. Ellen reported she has spent a lot of time responding to the media and meeting with our community partners. WIC will be waiving some requirements and nutrition counseling will be done by phone so they will not have to come inside of the building. Vital Records has made adjustments by having all of our funeral homes to park outside of the building and someone will go outside to pick up the death certificate and process while they wait it if they would like.

Ms. Ellen thanked the Board for coming out during this Pandemic and the next meeting will not be scheduled until June. She also reported if anyone had any questions or concerns to please feel free to call her. She will begin sending out to the Board the same weekly updates that are done for the County Commissioners.



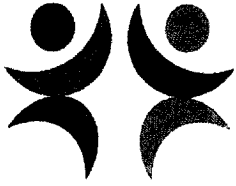

I. Introduction

In 1993, the North Carolina General Assembly established a network of local Child Fatality Prevention Teams (CFPT's) across the state to confidentially review medical examiner reports, death certificates and other records of deceased residents under age 18. Each local team consists of representatives of public and nonpublic agencies in the community such as law enforcement, Guardian Ad Litem, health departments, among others, that provide services to children and their families.

The purpose of this report is to give a summary of the causes of death, the number of cases reviewed, recommendations for prevention, if any, that have been made and to share local team activities and accomplishments.

II. Role of the County Commissioners and Board of Health

- Receive annual reports which contain recommendations and advocate for system improvements and needed resources, if requested.
- Appoint members of the local team as identified by the membership.

III. Child Deaths by Cause, System Problems Identified, Recommendations for Prevention & Proposed Action

In 2019, the Wilson County CFPT reviewed 21 child deaths and identified 3 system problems. One case that is currently in the county court system still needs to be reviewed and hopefully will be reviewed sometime in 2020.

IV. Wilson County CFPT Activities and Accomplishments


- The annual CFPT Activity Summary was completed and sent by the date requested.
- On January 16th, several members participated in a training on Trauma and Opioids held at Barton College provided by Dr. George Ake, from the Duke Center for Child and Family Health; and several are participating in a Trauma Informed Community Collaborative.
- Also some Community partners are developing a community plan to address health and well-being, and pinwheels are used during the month of April at several community partner sites to support families and public policies that prioritize prevention of child abuse and neglect.
- Several team members participated in the annual Kids on the Lawn Celebration at the Wilson County Public Library in April, 2019. Celebrated the Week of the Young Child and Child Abuse Prevention Month. Kids on the Lawn offers families a chance to come together for fun, food and entertainment. Many local businesses, nonprofits and community groups gathered on the library lawn for games, face painting, a magic show and many other fun and educational activities. Several hundred children participated in the 2019 event. Specific information was provided on child abuse prevention, installation of car seats, child safety and child development.
- Several team members participated in a Trauma/Resilience Training and viewed the film “Resilience-Unstuck Responding to Trauma and Resilience” and interactive discussion: presenter Wanda Boone, on May 15, 2019.
- Several team members participated in a Grief Awareness Webinar entitled “Understanding Grief: An Overview” on September 18, 2019.
- Wilson County Department of Social Service presented a Safe Sleep Ambassador Training on September 19th at the quarterly CFPT meeting. Also sent a link to team members and agency partners for on-line training to become a Safe Sleep Ambassador.
- Individual reports were completed on child deaths reviewed by the team and were forwarded to the State Coordinator.
